United in our mission to create opportunities for the children, families, and communities we serve.


Listen to the stories of the children, youth, and families Children's Aid serves, and it's impossible not to be moved by their determination to persevere against adversity and hardship. In Children's Aid they have a partner helping them break from a cycle of poverty into a world of opportunity.

As an organization, we constantly work to meet their needs, and have taken significant steps to strengthen our infrastructure in order to do so. In 2019, record-breaking milestones in key outcomes proved these steps are working. Consider this: 93% of our early childhood kids met or exceeded developmental milestones; 91% of kids ages 3-7 receiving medical care in our community centers had annual physicals; and 100% of high school graduates in targeted college prep programs who applied to college received acceptances. And one of our preventive services teams, which helps families avoid foster care placements, was ranked #1 out of 550 globally. This is transformational. This is what everyday greatness looks like.

Your role in this success cannot be overstated. Without your support, there is no Children's Aid. Only together, as donors, partners, and staff, can we ensure our programs and services meet the needs of our children — every day.

Children's Aid goes the extra mile to help even the youngest children unlock their potential.

What does everyday greatness look like for a child entering kindergarten? For Myiah Gulley, those first steps into kindergarten were the culmination of efforts by her preschool teachers at Children's Aid's Richmond Early Learning Center on Staten Island, and Myiah's own determination.

At 4 years old, Myiah was verbalizing only one-word answers and demonstrating difficulties with motor skills and focus. Adding to her developmental delays, Myiah had severe dental issues that required surgery, resulting in an extended absence from school.

But her Children's Aid teachers stepped in, providing academic interventions and recommending health care providers that ultimately allowed Myiah to return to school free of pain and ready to realize her full potential. In fact, she responded so well to occupational therapy that her teachers recommended she enter mainstream kindergarten, something no one could have foreseen just a year earlier. And although Myiah still receives supports, her progress is apparent to everyone, every day.

Children's Aid gives teens and young adults the opportunity, education, and resources to fulfill their dreams.

For Tyrese Avery, 18, it's all about connecting the dots: from his mom who connected him with Children's Aid programming at his high school; to Children's Aid's Dunlevy Milbank Center in Harlem, where staff tutored him in writing and kept him focused on college; to a Milbank staff member hearing his phenomenal singing voice and encouraging him to audition for the Children's Aid-Garden of Dreams talent show. He took her advice to audition, and then lightning struck.

He won the opportunity of a lifetime: to perform at Radio City Music Hall in front of 6,000 people, amidst fog machines and alongside the Rockettes. "Hamilton" actor Christopher Jackson also presented him with \$11,000 in scholarships, which is helping fund Tyrese's freshman year at New York University.

When he looks at his life now, Tyrese can see how all the dots connect, with Children's Aid running all along that continuum. "They all gave me an outlet to have a voice," he says. "They allowed me to become who I was supposed to be."

Strengthening Our Infrastructure


This year, we have continued to make our infrastructure stronger across each of our sites. We are focusing on outcomes, refining our data systems, and sharing best practices to enhance how we work. Further, we are providing staff with training, development opportunities, and an enhanced workspace design. And we do all of this with an emphasis on greatness, every day, for the youth and families we serve.

Advocating for Families

We go further than providing services to children — we advocate for legislative change to protect, enhance, and expand these direct services. This year in Albany, we secured \$250 million for the community schools model throughout the state, and \$6 million in college and career funding for youth in foster care. In New York City, we helped achieve pay equity to ensure our early childhood workers are paid at the same level as those employed directly by the city, and restored funding for after-school programs. And we'll continue to advocate, each and every day until the fight against childhood poverty is won.

Leveraging Partnerships

We forged new impactful external partnerships to expand the network for our children this year. We teamed up with Nike and Kobe Bryant to launch the Mamba League basketball program, and The Wallace Foundation to design an after-school arts initiative. We also established strategic partnerships with the NYPD on community outreach efforts at our early childhood centers, with the city to pilot a new domestic violence intervention, and with Binghamton University to create the nation's first online community schools certificate program.

Every day Angel Romero helps his students achieve their own personal greatness. Youth who come to Children's Aid's Next Generation Center (NGC) face very real challenges navigating foster care, criminal records, substance abuse, and homelessness. Working with them has special meaning for Angel, who grew up without a hand to guide him. "I believe all they need is an opportunity and a shining light to show them the way," he says. "Society is very fragile, and the key to keeping society vibrant is education. We're making changes, right here in the Bronx, in terms of employment, in terms of education," he says. "That's why I'm so committed to Children's Aid." As a program manager of NGC's high school equivalency program, Angel has presided over the graduations of more than 100 students since 2011.

Every day, individual, foundation, and corporate supporters help our young people to be great. The investments they make in our programs, and the enthusiasm and vision they offer in creating new, bold ways to empower our communities are fundamental to what we do. Because of their generosity, we

We leveraged \$115 million for programming to transform the lives of children and their families.

We are pleased to present our fiscal year 2019 financial report based on our audited financial statements for the year ending June 30, 2019. Children's Aid continues to have diverse revenue streams and a solid base of reserves.

We raised \$128.4 million in operating revenue and ended the year with total assets of \$412.4 million. We spent \$139.3 million on operating expenses, allocating 82.9 percent of our operating expenses toward programs, 14.3 percent toward management and general, and 2.8 percent toward fundraising.

Children's Aid ended FY 2019 with a \$10.9 million deficit from operations. Timing differences between the receipt and recognition of revenue and related expenditures accounted for more than half of the deficit. Prior year disallowance of expenses billed to governmental agencies and service related revenue shortfalls accounted for much of the rest.

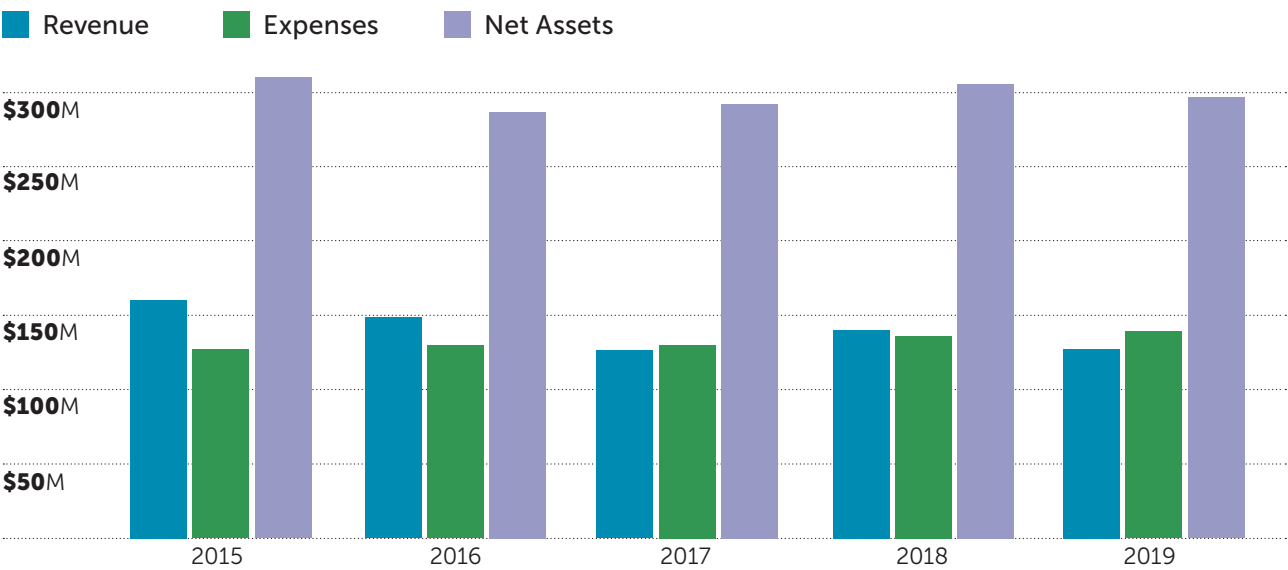
Moving to a new headquarters in the heart of Harlem.

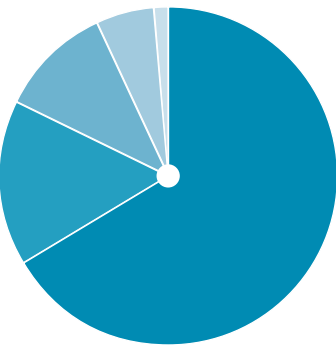

Five-Year Financial Analysis



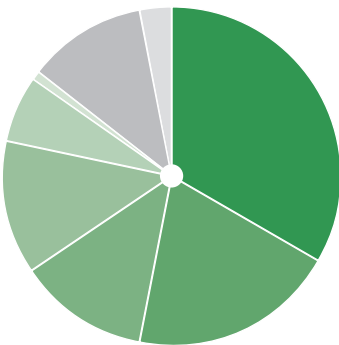

I AM DESTINED TO BE MY BEST ME.

Menorah Hawkins is brave beyond her years. When she first arrived at Children's Aid's Dunlevy Milbank Center in Harlem for dance lessons at 5 years old, the youngest kid in a room full of older middle schoolers, she wasn't intimidated. Now 12, Menorah has performed often, including at a Children's Aid event before more than 500 guests. And with school, Milbank's tutors continued offering help and instilling the confidence she needed to earn 'A's year after year.

That bravery was helpful when financial difficulties forced Menorah, her mom, and baby sister into a shelter. Throughout that ordeal, Menorah kept dancing, and stayed active in Milbank's "Study Now, Play Later" program on weekends to maintain her grades.

Her mom, meanwhile, struggled to find a job and get her family into permanent housing, and recalls the support she received from Milbank Director Casper Lassiter, from resume feedback, to referrals and advice. "He helped me a lot," she says.

Today, Menorah's family resides happily in their own apartment, not far from where her mom works full-time at a health care facility. "Milbank connects me to a lot of good opportunities," Menorah says.
